

Smith, pers. comm.). Other temperatures reported to be 1. associated with various life stages and activities of the species are presented in Table 2. Feeding by adult shortnose sturgeon in freshwater portions of Saint John River, Canada (Dadswell 1979), is confined largely to periods when water temperature exceeds 10 C. A temperature decline of 2 to 3 C during fall stimulated downriver migration to overwintering sites in the Pee Dee River, South Carolina (Dadswell et al. 1984), and a decrease in temperature from 19 to 11 C stimulated fall migration in the Connecticut River (Buckley and Kynard 1985a). Movement onto spawning grounds during spring appears to be initiated by water temperature rising above 8 C (Pekovitch 1979; Taubert 1980a; Dadswell et al. 1984). Spawning was reported to occur when water temperature ranged from 10 to 12 C (Dadswell 1979; Taubert 1980a), 12 to 15 C (Taubert 1980a) and 11. 5 to 14. 0 C (Buckley and Kynard 1985b). Water velocity. Summer feeding areas of adult shortnose sturgeon generally have little or no current (McCleave et al. 1977; Dadswell 1979; Taubert 1980b). Estuarine overwintering sites are generally deep (10 m) with moderate tidal currents (Dadswell 1979).
